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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

FORMER BTU PRESIDENT ARCHIBALD MACKINNON SUCCUMBS

Former Boston Typographical Union No. 13 President Archibald C. MacKinnon passed away on May 24, 1985.

Brother MacKinnon was born in Moncton, New Brunswick, Canada on September 28, 1896. He played hockey and baseball professionally as a young man.

The former president joined the Canadian Army during World War I and was part of the first expeditionary force to France in 1914. He served in the Princess Pat's Canadian Light Infantry where he received a field commission, and he later transferred to the flying corps and completed his war service as a pilot in the Royal Air Force.

Brother MacKinnon joined the International Typographical Union in 1925 and was active in the Boston Typographical Union No. 13 affairs until his death. He served as the Union's president in the mid-sixties and vice-president until 1973. He was also a member of the local Executive Committee and served on every BTU committee during his sixty years in the union.

"Archie" could always be counted on to take a position on the issues and argue for what he believed was right. He never allowed disagreements to become personal and he always tried to protect the legitimate rights of all the members. He had attained the respect of management by maintaining honest and forthright positions in all his deliberations.

Brother MacKinnon maintained a close friendly relationship with all union officials in the printing industry.

President Vitale was going to present Mr. MacKinnon with his 60 year continuous ITU membership pin at the May union meeting.
