## Archibald MacKinnon

### Was typographer in Dedham

Archibald C. MacKinnon of Whiting avenue, Dedham, a former typographer for the Transcript Press in Dedham, died unexpectedly yesterday in his home. He was 89.

He was born in Moncton, N.B. There, as a youth, he was an outstanding athlete, playing semi-professional hockey and baseball.

In 1914, Mr. MacKinnon joined the first Canadian Expeditionary Force to be sent to France during World War I. He received his field commission as a second lieutenant with the Princess Pat Canadian Light Infantry.

He was transferred in 1917 to the Royal Air Force, where he became a pilot. At the time of his death, he was one of the few surviving members of the Canadian World War I Flyers.

Following the war, Mr. MacKinnon came to the United States. He worked as a typographer at the Transcript Press about 25 years before retiring in 1967.

He had served as president of the Boston Typographical Union No. 13 for one term and as vice president for three terms. He recently received his 60-year pin from the International Typographers Union.

Mr. MacKinnon was a past president of the Canadian Legion as well as a member of St. Mary's Church in Dedham and the Watertown Grange.

The husband of the late Josephine (Young) MacKinnon, he leaves two sons, George Y. of Hyde Park and Malcolm Y. MacKinnon of Norfolk; 10 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

A funeral Mass will be said at 10 a.m. Tuesday in St. Mary's Church, Dedham. Burial will be in St. Mary's Cemetery, Dedham.

### Donated his skills as attorney

A funeral Mass will be said at 9 a.m. today in St. Theresa's Church, West Roxbury, for attorney James P. McNamara, 90, of West Roxbury.

Mr. McNamara, who during his 52-year career as a probate attorney often donated his skills to local charities, died Monday in St. Patrick's Manor in Framingham after a long illness.

Mr. McNamara was born in Boston. After receiving his degree from Suffolk Law School, he enlisted in the Navy in 1918 during World War I.

From 1920 to 1951, he was an attorney with the Massachusetts Legal Aid Society in Boston. In 1953, he opened his own law practice in Pemberton Square on Tremont street in Boston. He retired in 1973.

During his career, Mr. McNamara had provided free counsel on adoption cases to the Catholic Charitable Bureau in Boston and Children's Aid Society in Boston.
